The Brush is Mightier: One Man's Mission to Rescue Art from the Taliban

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"Under the Taliban's occupation of Afghanistan, I was silenced, unable to express my art freely.

But since coming to the United States and joining the Center for the Study of Religion and Conflict, I have regained my voice."

Amid the horrors of war, survival needs often eclipse all else. But for Dr. Mohammad Yousof Asefi, a practicing physician and nationally recognized artist, saving Afghanistan's art was as critical as saving lives.

Under the Taliban's iron-fisted rule, Asefi risked his life to protect his country's cultural heritage – a mission he continues as artistin-residence at the Center for the Study of Religion and Conflict at Arizona State University.

In 1996, when the Taliban took control of Afghanistan and banned art depicting living beings, Asefi risked his life to protect the Afghan National Gallery's paintings.

He used watercolors to temporarily conceal human and animal figures in over 120 works. Despite the risk of death, he remained determined to save his country's artistic treasures.

"In times of oppression, artists have wielded their creativity as a powerful form of resistance. Art becomes a sacred act, challenging injustice, igniting hope and illuminating the resilience of the human spirit," said Center for the Study of Religion and Conflict Director, John Carlson.

After the Taliban fell in 2001, Asefi helped restore the altered paintings and opened a public gallery in Kabul. When the Taliban returned to power in 2021, he fled to the United States with his family, continuing his work at ASU.

Tom Mallon, a donor to the center's visiting scholars fund, described Asefi as "the bravest man I've ever met."

"Dr. Asefi's presence on campus gives students a chance not only to see an accomplished artist at work but also to be inspired by a man who fought for the liberty essential to every artist and every citizen of the world."

Asefi's journey highlights the enduring power of art in resisting oppression and understanding the human experience.
